Guggenheim Library presents "Una Storia Segreta-When Italian Americans were Enemy Aliens"

n Veteran's Day, November 11, the time came once again to honor those men and women who fought for the United States in times of war. On the 60th anniversary of the end of World War II, Monmouth University has gone the extra mile to honor Italian Americans who fought for the United States during WWII with a presentation of the exhibit "Una Storia Segreta-When Italian Americans Were Enemy Aliens."

The exhibit was organized by Professor Douglass of the History and Anthropology Department at MU. The exhibit is sponsored by The School of Humanities and Social Sciences and co-sponsored by The Honors School, The Foreign Language Studies Department, The History and Anthropology Department, The Global Understanding Project, and The Political Science Department. "Una Storia Segreta" opened on November 7, and will run until November 18 at the MU Library.

During a heart-felt introduction, Professor Douglass stated that,

"This is a project I've been living with since the end of July when I met Sam Fumosa." Since that time, she and Fumosa, former President of the Order of the Sons of Italy, have worked diligently to bring the exhibit to Monmouth University. On November 7, their dream was realized.

Professor Douglass's introduction was followed by a speech by a guest speaker, Vice Consul Paolo Toschi, Italian Consulate. Vice Consul Toschi was born in Ferrara, Italy in 1975. After graduating from the University of Strasburg in France and the Law School at the University of Ferrara in 2000, he worked at the European Parliament in France. He then attended Diplomatic School (SIOI) in Rome and joined the Italian Diplomatic Service and

> worked at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs in Rome in the Africa Department. From January to December of 2003, Vice Consul Toschi was the Italian National Delegate in the Africa working group of the Council of Ministers of the European Union in Brussels. He was appointed Vice Consul of Italy in Newark on August 2, 2004. Vice Consul Toschi spoke of the closeknit history of Italy and the United States.

Monmouth University and Drew University signed an agreement to provide a four-year dual degree program for students wishing to receive a Master's of Social Work and a Master's of Divinity degree.

Graduates of this program will be equipped with a theological foundation and with the clinical tools needed for various types of ministry and service to the community and/or the church.

"This program was created because Drew University's Theology School wanted to partner with us. The Master of Divinity prepares ministers in the United Methodist church. Having an MSW will assist these religious leaders in better serving the members of their congregation," said Robin Mama, chair of the Department of Social Work at Monmouth University, MSW program director, and representative of the International Federation of Social Workers at the UN.

On November 4, 5 and 6 Monmouth University's student run radio station, WMCX, 88.9 FM captured five awards at The National Broadcasting Society 2005 Freedom States Regional Convention at Kutztown University, in Kutztown, Pa. "I'm enormously proud of our students' success at the NBS Regionals. This confirms my belief that we have one of the finest radio curriculums and some of the finest radio students in the National Broadcasting Society," said Communication Professor and Media Lab Supervisor Chris Cavallaro.

WMCX, who was named one of the top 10 college radio stations in the nation last year, swept at the NBS regional convention by receiving every audio award given, the most awards won by competing schools.

Italian-American exhibit

He has hopes to enlighten people about how integral a role the US played in the liberation of Europe. He was "delighted" to see so many people, especially students, dedicated to learning about Italy and its language, culture, and history.

Anthony Martignetti, of the Order of the Sons of Italy, introduced the exhibit with a startling declaration of the atrocious treatment of Italo-Americans during World War II. For 60 years, Mr. Martignetti explained, the U.S. Government has denied the violation of civil rights not only of Italian Americans but also of German and Japanese Americans. Unlike the stories of Japanese internment and evacuation in the U.S., that of Italo-Americans is largely unknown. Executive Order 9066 which called for the mass internment of Japanese Americans was applied to Italian and German Americans as well. At the time of Pearl Harbor there were 600,000 Italian Americans who for one reason or another had not received their citizenship papers. These men and women were branded "Enemy Aliens" in January of 1942 and ordered to register at local Post Offices to be fingerprinted, photographed, and given enemy registration cards which they had to carry with them at all times.

This exhibit facilitated the passing of Public Law 106-451, "The Wartime Violations of the Italian American Civil Liberties Act," signed by President Clinton on November 7, 2000. This act mandated the Attorney General to "conduct a comprehensive review of the treatment by the United States Government of Italian Americans during WWII, and not later than 1 year after the date of the enactment of this Act shall submit to Congress a report documenting the findings of such a review." "Una Storia Segreta" or "A Secret Story" is the account of the injustices Italian Americans suffered at the hands of the US Government during WWII. "Una Storia Segreta" is a traveling exhibit of artifacts, memoirs, and photographs started by the American Italian Historical Association, Western Regional Chapter in 1993. The Garibaldi-Meucci Museum, a museum dedicated exclusively to Italian American history and culture, has sponsored the project for many years by assisting with its promotion and display across the counsaid. Mayor Chiarvallo went on to share his experiences with "commando training" in his high school gym class where he and his classmates climbed ropes and maneuvered through obstacle courses, a kind of "preliminary training" for potential future soldiers.

Rioting in Europe

France recently declared a "state of emergency," after riots broke out in Paris' suburbs. The riots were set off by an accident involving the deaths of two teenagers under the impression that they were being chased by police. The acts of violence, performed mainly by underprivileged youth, include shoving a burning car into a retiree center in Provence, throwing stones at police in the city of Lyon, and a failed attempt to throw a firebomb at a Mosque in Lyon. As many as 1,400 cars had been set on fire in one night, but violence has reportedly subsided, as the amount of car torches has gone done down significantly. To ensure security, about 40 towns have implemented a curfew for minors.

On October 27, the IAAOT [Italian American Association of Ocean Township] honored Americans of Italian descent with the Congressional Medal of Honor. A tribute to these soldiers was organized by Sam Fumosa, former President of the Order of the Sons of Italy and Monmouth University Professor Susan Douglass of the History and Anthropology Department. Professor Douglass organized this event as part of the background preparation for her Oral History Class project this fall "World War II At Home and Abroad- Case Study, the Italian American Community of New Jersey."

At the home of the IAAOT, The Renaissance in Ocean, NJ, Fumosa presented a poster exhibit on the 23 Italian-Americans who have been awarded the Medal of Honor. Fumosa provided a brief history of the award.

Scholinski sheds light on gender identity disorder

Many Monmouth University student organizations, including the Sociology Club, Gender Studies Club and Program, All Life Styles Included, the Office of Affirmative Action, the Social Work Department, and the Nursing Program, came together to offer MU students and staff the opportunity to hear a unique guest speaker.

On Thursday, November 10 in Anacon Hall, Dylan Scholinski spoke to students and faculty about his life, writing, and art as a transgender. His nearly two hour presentation included reading excerpts from his memoir, The Last Time I Wore a Dress, showing slides of his artwork, and explaining his experiences in mental institutions. Scholinski is a nationally renowned writer, speaker, and artist who has appeared on 20/20, Dateline, and The Today Show.

Daphne Scholinski was born in the 1960's in Chicago. As she was growing up, her parents thought her behavior was abnormal, and more like that of a boy. When Daphne was 15 years old, she was institutionalized for "feminine

years (1981-1984). In that time, to get her high school diploma from the mental institution, which of the stigma attached to being an ex-mental patient. Scholinski said that after all was said and done, about \$1 million was spent to make him feminine.

While in the hospital, Daphne was diagnosed with gender identity disorder and depression, and sexual abuse. Scholinski first read an excerpt from his memoir which was about his placement in the second mental institution. He said that he had two other girl roommates who always put makemasculine. This mental institution followed a "points system" in which Scholinski earned points for basic privileges as a reward for acting like a girl.

Then, Scholinski spoke about how he used to go grocery shopping with his father. One time, in sixth grade, to fool the doctors the store, he went to the women's bathroom, and the clerk told his father as if he was doing some-

He said that while residing there, the doctors read his journals in order to gain insight on his case. He eventually wrote things in his journals, which he has kept since

In a mellow atmosphere, a small group of people gathered at Java City Café Tuesday, November 8, to learn and respect American Sign Language. Danielle Ellement, a junior at Monmouth who received a full scholarship for softball, helps out the Catholic Centre by running a sign language class.

On this particular Tuesday night, the sign language class was held in the Student Center's Java City at 7:30 p.m. It is usually held at the Catholic Centre, which is in the corner of Lot 4 at 7:30 p.m. on Thursday nights. The class lasts approximately an hour. Along with having the opportunity to meet new people, there's free food, which is always a plus, according to Mrs. Jackobs, who runs the British Sign Language, even the Catholic Center.

Danielle was born deaf. The reason for it, she said, happened,

"Somewhere in a past generation, or because [her] mom had the flu while being pregnant." She is the only one in her family that is deaf. Danielle wants to grow up and become an American Sign Language teacher [ASL] in a high school. She believes that "people should learn ASL because then they can help people who are deaf." She also noted that a lot of people enjoy learning sign language and most don't have the opportunity to.

Danielle had a translator nearby as well, named Andrew Bowler, a graduate of Monmouth in 2004. Andrew and Danielle met at the Catholic Centre while he was a senior and she was a freshman, and they are now engaged.

Becoming aware of the deaf culture was also taught at the Java City class. ASL came from

Beginning September 2006, four students a year will be admitted to the program. These students must meet the entrance requirements for both Monmouth University's MSW program and Drew University's MDIV program.

"If there is more demand, we will look into increasing this number," said Mama.

The Department of Social Work at Monmouth University is accredited by the Council on Social Work Education. Its curriculum prepares students with a strong foundation and gives them the skills needed for the actual practice of social work. Students choose to concentrate on either the International and Community Development Track or the Practice with Families and Children Track.

"We have had several ministers, pastors, and rabbis go through our MSW program," explained Mama.

Drew University offers the Master's of Divinity degree, as it is the most recognized and sought after degree for religious professionals. Students gain a deep understanding of the Christian faith, its implications in the contemporary world, and practical ministry experience.

Maxine Beach, Dean of Drew Theological School, said, "We have and Chile.

been searching for a partner for a dual degree program and feel that we have found an excellent match with Monmouth's program. Their commitment to social justice issues matches our emphasis on these issues in our theological program."

Paul G. Gaffney II, President of Monmouth University, said, "We are thrilled to partner with Drew University on this important degree program. It is a wonderful opportunity for qualified students."

Students will complete their first two years in the program at Drew University, located in Madison, N.J., and return to Monmouth for their third year where they will complete the entire first year of MSW courses. The fourth year will involve courses taken at both schools.

Over the course of four years, students will take courses at Monmouth University such as Practice with Individuals and Families, Human Behavior, and Issues in International Development along with courses at Drew University such as Systematic Theology, Christian Ethics, and The Public Practice of Theology.

Students will also be required to do 1,000 hours of field internship, according to Mama.

Students can seek internship opportunities in the U.S. as well as seven other countries including, Bangladesh, India, Ghana, Latvia,

Protecting your home on a budget

In this day and age, everyone knows better than to leave the house (or apartment, studio, or trailer) without locking their doors and windows first. But what most people aren't aware of is that something as seemingly innocent as leaving an empty stereo box out on the curb for trash collection is an invitation to a burglary just waiting to happen. In America, where a burglary occurs once every 15 seconds and results in an approximate loss of about \$1,600, who wants to take the chance?

Certainly not college students, who, as renters, are even more likely than homeowners to be victims of a burglary, according to www.discovery.com.

The problem is, college students don't exactly have an extra \$2,600 lying around with which to install a high-tech alarm system or surveillance robot (yes, they do exist). So what's a student to do?

A good place to start would be to do what we do best: learn the facts. At least, that's what ex-cons Matt Johnston and Jon Douglass Rainey suggest. They're the hosts of Discovery Channel's It Takes a Thief,

knowledge about home security by breaking into their abodes and then providing them with a lesson on how to prevent the real thing afterwards.

Watch the show, which airs weekdays at 5 p.m., to boost your knowledge about theft prevention, and how to burglarize your home. Continue reading this article to learn how to do it at a price so cheap, even college students can afford to protect their dwellings (prices according to www. homedepot.com).

Tip #1: Deter thieves from trespassing onto your property

According to the reformed robbers, seasoned thieves know exactly what to look for, and will choose their targets carefully- by casing homes from the outside first. To discourage thieves from surveying your property, install a motion sensor spotlight near your driveways and/or porches. This will eliminate those dark and obscure shadows that fly-by-night burglars love to lurk in.

While motion sensor spotlights are relatively inexpensive, at \$19.84 each, they weigh in as most expensive on our list. The good news is, once you

a new series that tests America's shell out for the fixture, you'll only have to worry about replacing the bulbs once or twice a year, which are priced at a much cheaper \$5.97.

Tip #2: Become impenetrable to lock-picks

A recurring no-no commonly seen on It Takes a Thief is the reliance of original front door locks.

According to the series' Web site, front, back and garage doors are "the weakest point of entry for a robber." They're easy to pick and/or break through.

To kill two birds with one stone, purchase and install a heavy-duty dead bolt, which can be bought for a mere \$1.99. Crooks can neither pick it, nor successfully kick the door in as a result.

Tip #3: Prevent windows from being used as doorways to your possessions

For burglars, the next best thing to a door is a window. Even when locked, experienced robbers don't have a hard time prying them open just enough to squeeze through. Be-

Free strategies in protecting your living enviornment

With 4,000 of the total 6,000 MU students living off campus, theft prevention should be thoroughly considered by most of us. Especially since, as noted www.discoverychannel.com, on most burglaries occur between 9 a.m. and 3 p.m.: the time frame in which students are least likely to be home.

So, regardless of whether or not one can afford to take the precautions mentioned above, the following advice, which features entirely free ways to protect yourself from home theft, ought to be considered by everyone.

Adopt a guard dog: Who says all that incessant barking is unnecessary? Research shows that dogs really *do* deter burglars from breaking and entering (although they should never be solely relied on as a safety precaution), as basement, shed, or garage, and

their barking attracts the one thing thieves never want: attention. An adopted dog will provide loyalty, good company, and better security.

Don't leave spare keys outside: Experienced crooks almost always find spare keys, regardless of whether they're hidden under the mat, in a plastic rock, or buried in a flower pot. The safest way to prevent yourself from being locked out of the house is to leave a spare key with a neighbor or someone else that you trust instead.

Keep your property uncluttered: Often, victims of theft unknowingly provide thieves with the exact method by which they are able to unlawfully enter. Garbage cans, ladders, and tools have all been used by intruders to easily gain entry inside. Make sure these items are locked away in a

Also, as mentioned in the above article, electronics boxes should never be left out on the curb for trash collection. It's a sure signal to robbers that there is new, ex-

pensive equipment ready for the taking inside. Break down boxes and place them in the trash can instead.

Keep foliage well-trimmed: Overgrown shrubs, bushes and other various forms of plant life make for great hiding places.

Regularly trimming these will greatly reduce the number of places a crook can hide out when attempting to perform or flee from a break-in.

Also, keep any trees on your property well-pruned; large branches are easily climbable and offer burglars a way to access second story windows.

Protect sliding glass doors: If you live in one of the many rentals that have sliding glass doors, beware. Robbers are experts at breaking the feeble locks such doors are often equipped with.

The good news is, you can easily prevent burglars from entering through sliding glass doors regardless of their locksmith capabilities; simply place a wooden dowel, thin piece of metal pipe, or sturdy branch inside the track, so that it fits snugly between the door and frame. Burglars will most likely be unable to penetrate your measure of defense!

Never put your name on the mailbox: As www.discoverychannel.com points out, anyone can use your name to "call directory assistance, get your number, and find out you aren't home." Use house address numbers as a means of identification for the postman instead.

Don't advertise that you aren't home: If you plan on being away from your home for a few days, make sure you suspend newspaper deliveries for the duration that you'll be gone: nothing says "no one's been around here" better than yesterday's news strewn about the front lawn!

Also, if you use a mailbox, request that your mail be held at the post office until you return, or ask your neighbor to collect it for you. While you're at it, also ask your neighbor to park in your driveway or in front of the house, to give the appearance that someone is inside.

Although I am proud to attend a college where it is accepted to print a controversial article supporting gay marriage, and certainly appreciate the work that goes into writing such an article, I was disappointed in the lack of solid arguments and concrete facts in Ms. Lucas' piece.

First, I have to question where the statistics presented in the article came from. Without a source, they seem assumed; this may result in the reader not taking the article seriously, which could be detrimental, as the LGBT (Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgendered) rights movement needs as much support as possible. I was specifically concerned with the statement that anyone who is against gay marriage holds this opinion because of their religious values. I disagree with those who do not support LGBT rights, but I know that many people

feel this way for other reasons than religion. If both sides continue to fling assumed statistics and opinions back and forth, the argument will continue.

The author also mentions that adding an amendment banning gay marriage is a denial of full equality to LGBTs, but she does not discuss civil unions, the concept of which is important to understand when attempting to find a solution to this issue. The author also mentions that children that are the product of LGBT parenting often "do better" than children from families that include one mother and one father. I found myself questioning her criterion for declaring who is "better." The idea is not to put alternative families on a pedestal, but note that gay and straight families are both equal, which is the idea that we are fighting for.

While I agree with the author on the subject of gay marriage, I felt the need to express my disappointment in the presentation of her argument. If we assume that we know what others are thinking, without having the evidence to support it, then an understanding between gay marriage supporters and opposers will never be reached. Understanding and tolerance will lead to a mutual respect, which will help resolve this conflict.

But the majority of those in attendance attribute the highlight of the evening to renowned groove band "The Soul Project," who captivated the interest of every warm, breathing body in the venue through the unique ambiance that their music created. Consisting of members from Bradley Beach, Belmar, and New Orleans, "The Soul Project" personified the night's celebration of musical dexterity and originality through their unique combination of jazz, percussion, and blues.

Local indie rock band "What About Frank" also heavily contributed to the night's entertainment factor; as Scott Stamper observed, they "had a tremendous intensity level on-stage" that served as testament to the fact that original bands don't necessarily need a \$10,000 stage show in order to entertain and engross audience members.

As guitarist Dave points out, the band was "up against friends like "Low Flying Jets" for the Top Indie Rock Band Award, which is tough because although you want to win, you don't want your friends to lose.'

Also among the night's winners was Monmouth University's own Bob Voorhees, who is the Aquatics Director for the University as well as the coach of the Master's Swim Team and the advisor to the Water Polo Club. He's also the bassist for "Hub City Stompers," who took home the 2005 Award for Top Ska Band.

When asked to comment on his award, Voorhees stated that "it's nice to be acknowledged for playing ska, since it's kind of in a recession at the moment, not being a part of the mainstream right now."

"Hub City Stompers" will likely be giving an interview on the University's WMCX radio station, which Voorhees encourages students to listen for. "There are a lot of amazing original bands out there," says Voorhees, "but they're overshadowed by all the cover bands that are popular at the moment." He encourages students to come out and give shows like the Asbury Music Awards a chance.

Local favorites "Exit 105" also made history at the 2005 Asbury Music Awards with their award for Top Pop Band. According to frontman Mike Strollo, the award was "very unexpected," but is appreciated nonetheless because "it's nice to know people are listening to ya. It's very hard to get heard these days." As a singer/songwriter since the age of 16, Strollo has been an integral part of the Jersey Shore's local music scene for quite some time, and as indicated by his band's name, still maintains his pride in emerging from the subculture that is the Jersey Shore's local music scene.

The winners all have good reason to be as appreciative as they are of their recognition; their victory is not the merely the result of their friends and fans stuffing ballots but rather, a decision rendered by a selective voting process.

Each year, ballots are cast only by a select group of music industry "insiders," according to Stamper. Although the identities of the voters remain a tight-lipped secret, professionals ranging from club owners and radio DJs to news journalists and concert promoters compose each year's official voting panel.

The Asbury Music Awards is regarded by many as a major local music event. But just how impressive of an event is it, really?

To begin with, Scott Stamper and the Asbury Music Company spare no expense in hosting the annual awards show. Monies raised through a series of other events prior to the big show is used to gain sponsors, pay for radio and newspaper advertising, purchase the 32 award trophies, print program guides, pay event staff, create poster art and flyers, and to deliver and pick up ballots. As Stamper states, "we give back our good will to the scene by strenuously spending two months prior in preparation for the show."

Stamper further comments that "awards shows solidify what everyone is doing, whether it's the performers, promoters, or club owners, by acknowledging the hard work of everyone involved in the local music scene.'

Furthermore, past Asbury Music Awards shows have awarded artists who have gone on to achieve national or international recognition, including: "Borialis," who is now signed to Shore music scene history!

Sonv Records, "De Sol," who have recently opened for REM during their tour in Mexico, and Nicole Atkins, former Top Song, Female Vocalist and New Release winner who now has the interest of more than one major record label.

But at the end of the day, what remains most important to everyone is the way the Asbury Music Awards unifies the Jersey Shore's local music scene.

One of the most unique aspects of the area's local music scene is the fact "that we even have an awards show." says Stamper, which is important in itself as it is the one thing that "brings the majority of the scene together once a year, despite the differences in music. We all work together to get noticed through the awards show."

So if you missed this year's awards show, take solace in the fact that as long as local musicians continue to offer the mixture of musical talent and ability indigenous to the Jersey Shore, there will always be an Asbury Music Awards show to attend. "This album was about exploration and challenge," says Brandon Schneider of Modern Films, a oneman ambient music project based out of Lincoln, Nebraska.

Bloody Valentine, Slowdive, and Mimir. "There were so many influences for this album. Right before production, I had been listening to The Field Of Mice and The Microphones nonstop," Schneider says. He adds, "I took a lot of the isolated feeling of the album from the Icelandic pop

The whole album was recorded at home on an HP laptop computer, a technique that's becoming the standard for musicians who don't want to spend money on studio time. It also gives them total creative control and many possibilities for effects and mixing.

As for future plans, Schneider will try to play as many live shows as possible this spring, then possibly put a press kit together to send to a few independent ambient music labels. > Did you know that nutrition could play a crucial role in preventing permanent hearing loss? According to Kathleen Campbell, PhD, director of audiology research at Southern Illinois University, "a diet that is rich in selenium and vitamins A, C, and E has been proven to decrease the damage caused by loud noises, and prevent hearing loss." If you need to up your dosage on magnesium and selenium, then incorporate fish and nuts into your diet.

> According to Dr. Blumberg, "occasional overindulgence does not deplete your vitamin intake." However, researchers have linked excessive consumption of alcohol to heart disease, and some cancers. In order to avoid the potential risks of alcoholism and liver failure, increase your intake of folate, and vitamin B. If you are a regular at the local bars, make certain you take in plenty of antioxidants, including vitamins C and E. We are still waiting for scientists to invent a pill that can burn calories within minutes, but until that time arrives try niacin, which is in the vitamin-B family, and helps to

"We are investigating several possibilities and leads at this time," said Chief of Monmouth University Police William McElrath.

The robbery took place when the suspects talked their way into a Garden Apartment. After resident realized that no one knew any of the suspects they were asked to leave. The suspects then left but robbed an unrelated individual walking through the area of the Garden Apartments. Although no weapon was involved, the suspects assaulted and robbed the victim of money. The incident was reported by a parent of the victim four hours later.

Recently there have been a number of crimes on campus, a sexual incident and the Athletic Department robbery, when asked if the recent out lash of events was alarming. Chief McElrath replied, just as in any municipal community, some crime will take place. The incidents described are in fact isolated incidents and not part of a larger crime pattern.

McElrath believes that the University community has no reason to be alarmed, "Monmouth University is a very safe campus especially if students and employees take the necessary precautions to avoid being victimized."

It was also advised by McElrath that students and faculty be aware of their surroundings and notify the police immediately if they see anything of suspicious nature.

"Every Police Department needs the assistance of the community they serve. If anyone has any information on crimes about campus, they must report it to the police immediately. It is only through the cooperation of the police and the community that crime problems can be resolved."

He also urges residents to lock their doors at all times and be sure of whom they are opening their doors to.

Anyone who is walking around

during the late hours should avoid walking alone and should take advantage of the 24 hour, 7 day a week security escort service through the University Police by calling the station at (732) 571-3472.

Your eagerness to learn through attending sessions, networking, interacting with professionals, and being willing to absorb will determine how much the convention will help your career."

WMCX Senior Consultant Matt Siciliano expressed the feeling of 'you get what you make out of the convention" and felt the most fundamental information was obtained through networking with opposing schools.

'KUR is less than a fourth the size of WMCX, and those kids have the kind of heart that college radio is all about."

A number of recognizable voices and faces were seen at the convention. Keynote speaker Rob Jennings of WPVI-TV left inspiring words on Tom Hanley, NBS Chapter President, "he was full of insight and encouraged students to never give up because opportunity could appear when one least expects it."

Occhipinti felt that the professionals he spoke to, most of whom were anchors and broadcasters from the Philadelphia area "were very helpful and complementary.'

Professionals advice was simi-

lar to guidance offered in the classroom, "they offered the same advice as professors, such as the importance of internships and marketing yourself when you graduate," said Occhipinti

Hanley is already planning for the MU Chapter at the National Convention in Washington DC early March.

He believes that students can prove themselves even more worthy this upcoming year, "we intend to win just as many, if not more, this year. Hawks cap off third straight winning season with 16-13 last second win

MU comes back to dash Albany's NEC title hopes

Monmouth University turned back the clock to 2004 and recaptured some last-second magic as they concluded the 2005 season with a 26-yard field goal by placekicker Fred Weingart as time expired for a 16-13 win over rival Albany this past Saturday. With the win, the Hawks end the year with a 6-4 record, their third straight Albany 10-yard line. season with a winning mark.

The Hawks, who last season became the only NCAA team to ever win three games on the final play of regulation in the same season, appeared to be headed for a loss with the score tied 13-13 with just less than 2:00 minutes remaining and Albany driving into scoring territory.

The Great Danes had 2nd-and-8 at the Monmouth 36-yard line with 1:44 showing on the clock, but defensive lineman Paul Trass registered a sack of Albany quarterback Brett Hall for a loss of nine yards and on the following 3rd-and-17 play, cornerback David Jiles intercepted a Hall pass at the MU 25-yard line and returned it 20 yards.

Quarterback Brian Boland rushed for 24 yards on the next play to put Monmouth into Albany territory at the 31-yard line. Walter Carter, who received the bulk of the carries with Bobby Smith out with an injury, rushed the ball four consecutive times for 21 yards to put the ball at the

The Hawks 26 wins over the last three seasons is the most in the NEC since Sacred Heart won 28 from 2000-2002.

> The Hawks called their last time out with two seconds remaining in the game. Wiengart set up for the game winner, but Albany called a timeout to try and ice the sophomore. He was not distracted as his 26-yard attempt sailed through the uprights as the final gun sounded.

The loss prevented Albany from sharing share the Northeast Conference title as Stony Brook defeated Central Connecticut State 23-21 to earn a the title of co-champions.

Both schools ended the year with a 5-2 mark in league play and because the NEC has no postseason play, the two team's shared the title. The Great Danes end the season with a 4-6 overall mark and a 4-3 record in league action.

Albany started fast and scored on its first drive of the game. The Great Danes cruised 60 yards on eight plays and senior fullback Dan Beigel hauled in a 31-yard TD pass from Brett Hall to put Albany up 7-0, 5:10 into the contest.

Weingart added the Hawk's first points of the game on a field goal with 14:07 remaining in the second quarter to trim Albany's edge to 7-3. Monmouth took its first lead of the game with 7:03 left until halftime as Boland hit Adam San Miguel for a 19-yard scoring strike, giving Monmouth a 10-7 lead. That lead would stand going into halftime.

The Hawks inflated the cushion to 13-7 as time expired in the third quarter as Weingart made a career and season long 41-yard field goal as Monmouth took advantage of a Beigel fumble recovered by Jamaal McClintock, who was playing for the injured Nick Castellano.

A Monmouth fake punt early in the fourth quarter backfired and Albany took over with great field position at the MU 45-yard line. The Great Danes traveled those 45 yards on 11 plays, culminating in an eight vard touchdown pass by Hall to back-up tight end Wayne Carrubus to tie the score at 13-13 with 10:16 remaining in the game

The go-ahead point after touch-

Jiles led the Hawks' defense with two interceptions. He ended his career ranked second on Monmouth's all-time interception list with eight, trailing only Vinnie Sasso with 11.

Boland also inflated his single-season school record for scoring passes to 21 and his single-season school record for total offense to 2,518.

His season-ending total of 184 rushing yards is the most ever amassed by a Monmouth signalcaller. San Miguel hauled in six passes for 97 yards in the game. He became just the second Monmouth player to log 50 or more receptions

Men's Soccer Hawks end season in championship game

The Monmouth University men's soccer team, who finished the year with a 10-4-6 record, came one win shy of making its first ever appearance in the NCAA Tournament on Sunday as they fell in the Northeast Conference Tournament championship game to Robert Morris 3-2 in overtime on The Great Lawn.

"We can either look at the loss one of two ways," said Northeast Conference Coach of the Year Rob McCourt. "Either as a defeat or as a positive as us being ahead of schedule."

The two teams battled goal for goal throughout regulation but the Colonials' Jacek Przednowek scored the game winner with under two minutes remaining in the first overtime.

Monmouth trailed 1-0 until the 43:51 mark when freshman Rob

LaRocca scored his first goal of Steven Holloway to tie the game.

Robert Morris then reclaimed the lead during the 68th minute of play and the Blue and White were forced to play catch-up yet again.

Junior Jonathan Schmid connected on a header at the 72:32 mark to tie the game up at 2 and would be the last goal of regulation and for Monmouth in 2005.

"We were very unlucky to not come away with the championship, but that's athletics," said McCourt.

The Blue and White advanced to the championship game after defeating the 4th seed Sacred Heart Pioneers 2-1 in double overtime on Friday afternoon to open up the NEC Tournament.

Second-team All-NEC sophomore Tom Gray scored the gamewinning goal during the 107th minthe fans into frenzy.

Hawks to open up 2005 season out West with high hopes

The 2005-2006 Monmouth University men's basketball team will be looking to bring a school record third-consecutive Northeast Conference regular season championship to West Long Branch this season.

"To win consistently, you have to play solid defense night in and night out," coach Dave Calloway said. "This year, we will go as far as our defense and cohesiveness takes us. The way we see it, if you can prevent the other team from scoring that allows you to work through offensive struggles."

Last season, the Hawks were picked near the top of the conference by most national publications, and they did not disappoint. The Blue and White responded by winning the first outright regular season NEC championship in school history going 14-4 in league play.

"We have the best home-court advantage in the NEC," added Calloway. "We used the sixth man to our full benefit last season and look forward to playing front of the best fans in our conference again this vear.'

A big part of the recent success enjoyed by the Hawks, especially last year, is due to a pair of graduated seniors who will be missed during this season. Guard Dwayne Byfield and forward Blake Hamilton were instrumental in leading Monmouth to back-to-back NEC regular season titles, including a conference tournament championship and appearance in the NCAA Tournament two years ago.

"Anytime you lose players who contributed greatly, it is difficult to try and replace them," said Calloway. "They were all great guys, will be missed."

This season, the Hawks will once again feature one of the top defenses in the NEC. Monmouth has led the conference in scoring defense 12 of the last 16 years. In the last five seasons, the Hawks have lost just two games when holding their opponents to less than 60 points.

The main task of replacing the departed Hamilton falls to Marques Alston, who showed last year that he has the potential to be an All-NEC performer. He showed he has a flair for the dramatic, as

he hit three game-winning, buzzerbeating shots a season ago.

"Marques always comes ready to play every night," Calloway said. "He's always composed no matter what the situation and is a calming influence on the court for us."

Last season, Tyler Azzarelli improved his offensive output from 3.8 ppg to 8.3 ppg, and Chris Kenny is the Hawk's leading returning scorer after averaging 9.6 ppg a vear ago.

The Hawks open the season on Monday, November 21st at San Francisco, 10 p.m., which will be a tune up for the Great Alaska Shootout which begins for the Hawks early Friday morning, midnight, which is 8 p.m. Thanksgiving night Alaskan.

Women's hoops tips off this weekend in Florida

In the early 1970s it was David Bowie who sang about "changes." In the present day, the Monmouth University women's basketball is set to open up their basketball season after having undergone significant changes themselves.

Gone from last year's team, which finished 17-11, 13-5 in Northeast Conference play, are five key players, which now force the Hawks to play as a young team. Last year's starters Courtney Lumpkin and Erin Winston have graduated, as well as role players Bridgette Bynum and Tara Steffanucci, while Liz Whalen had to retire due to injuries. That leaves the only senior on this year's team as unanimous all-preseason NEC selection, Hawks guard, Niamh Dwyer. Last season, Dwyer averaged 16.6 points per game, which was fourth in the conference.

Another change is that Michelle Baxter will begin her first full season as the Hawks head coach this year, after leading the Hawks to an 8-4 record down the stretch after taking over in February for Jackie DeVane. Baxter led Monmouth on a six game win streak down the stretch to overtake Quinnipiac for the fourth seed and the right to host a first round playoff game in the NEC Tournament.

More changes surrounding the coaching staff were that Jewonda Bright, one of the top scoring Hawks in team history, and Felicia Burroughs were added along with Jim Baxter as assistant coaches.

Meanwhile, while the Hawks have gotten young, it seems so has the rest of the conference as well, making the 2006 NEC Tournament title completely up for grabs. Of the top three other teams in the NEC Pre-Season Poll besides Monmouth, Robert Morris, Sacred Heart, and St. Francis PA, the Hawks have a legitimate case against all three.

And while the old saying goes in order to be the champ you have to beat the champ, this could be the year the rest of the conference finally catches up to the four time defending champion Red Flash, after they lost Beth Swink, Christin Black, Regina Schlichter, and Sarah Bolten to graduation.

"I really feel the NEC Champs could be any one of these four teams," commented Coach Baxter, "It will all come down to who is the most injury free and who is on a roll at the start of the tournament...hopefully that will be us."

Last season, the Hawks did rely on newcomers, as then freshmen Brianne Edwards, Veronica Randolph, and Lindsey Zegowitz were huge contributors and earned significant playing time as the year went on.

In their exhibition game this past Sunday at Boylan Gym, the inexperience showed at times, in a 79-71 loss, as the Hawks committed 35 turnovers and committed 36 fouls. Dwver scored a team high 16 points in the exhibition against the New York Gazelles.

Freshman Marisa Jimenez had nine points off the bench, and Rachel Ferdinand had five points, three rebounds, and four steals. 'We are real excited about our freshmen class," said Coach Baxter, "Marisa showed a lot of skill during our exhibition game and will keep getting more minutes as she continues to improve. Both Rachel Ferdinand and Lakia Barber will bring us much needed rebounding in the small forward position. They both play very hard and continue to get better every day."

The Hawks will play in the FAU Tip-Off Classic this weekend to tip off their 2005-06 regular season. Monmouth will play Delaware State on Friday night and Navy on Saturday.
