Blitz Week Gets Students Geared Up For Relay for Life

If students noticed caution tape and "no smoking" signs posted on buildings such as Jules L. Plangere Center and Wilson Hall on Thursday, it was because of Colleges Against Cancer, which was promoting Blitz Week for Relay for Life.

A variety of events took place throughout the course of the week in order to raise awareness about smoking and also about the annual Relay for Life event. The Silent Basket Auction began its bidding from Tuesday through Thursday, in which all bids were automatically donated to Relay for Life. Twenty-two baskets were on display in the Rebecca Stafford Student Center, some of them including: From the bidding, approximately 1,242 dollars was raised. "It is a great start to reaching the goals we set over the summer with how much we wanted to raise for this year's event," Passalacqua, --- said.

Co-Chair Sharon Smith, who has been a part of Relay for Life,

enjoys working with the students to put Relay for Life together. "Our students organize our Relay, they chair all the committees and they are responsible for every aspect of this incredible event. Words cannot describe the feelings everyone comes away with because they witnessed and participated in a Relay For Life at Monmouth University. Because of these feelings I will continue to work with our outstanding students on our Relay For Life."

Tobacco Specialist Helene Long was the speaker at a session on Wednesday from 2 pm to 3 pm in Wilson Hall to promote awareness about the Great American Smokeout and attempt to get students involved in the event.

A Deal or No Deal themed game show titled, "Smoke It or Broker It" took place in the Oakwood Lounge on Wednesday night at 10 pm. In the game, contestants faced a total of 14 cases. In seven of the cases, there were ingredients in cigarettes that

University Provides Alternative to Admissions Essay Via Facebook

The traditional formal admissions essay may no longer be required for prospective Monmouth University students. The university now provides students with the option of submitting a personal statement via Facebook, a popular social networking site.

The choice to integrate a video submission option and the customary formal written essay was made due to the overwhelming popularity of social networks. Officials recognized the opportunity to connect with those applying to Monmouth through a more modern and technologically savvy method.

Lauren Vento Cifelli, Director of Undergraduate Admissions, said, "So many students are using social networks to communicate on a daily or weekly basis. Since Monmouth allows

students to submit an optional personal statement, this was an opportunity for us to bring a piece of the application to the medium they are comfortable using. Both the personal statement and the video statement are optional components to the application."

The majority of students who choose to apply to Monmouth submit a personal statement along with their application, however; thus far only four students have decided to make use of the new video submission option. Those working in admissions believe that personal statements submitted through the alternative video option will become more accepted once prospective students learn more about it. Also, admissions officials believe that some students feel more comfortable writing their thoughts as opposed to speaking in front of a camera. It may be that only those that

are comfortable in front of a camera will take advantage of this opportunity to tell counselors about themselves.

Other schools have encouraged students to use video submissions for acceptance in the past. The difference between these schools and what Monmouth is doing is that MU is using a mainstream social networking site, Facebook, as a platform for the videos.

Vento Cifelli said, "Monmouth is one of the first, if not the first, school in the country to do this."

Admissions counselors have not found any disadvantages to using Facebook as a means of completing admission requirements. They do feel that this new method will bring about many advantages though, and some students agree.

Joe Scarpino, a junior psychology major said, "I think being able to use Facebook or any

social networking site to apply to a college is a great idea. The way young people communicate has changed over the years, straying away from more traditional means and into more modern technologically based systems."

Using social networking sites to gain admissions can also provide schools with a better knowledge of who the prospective student is. Vento Cifelli believes that a person's personality comes through more vividly through the videos, which helps counselors make a more educated decision about the student. However, admission decisions are not based solely on a student's video submission if they do choose this option.

Vento Cifelli said, "We continue to use the formal application, transcript, test scores, and other provided information to make admission decisions, with our primary focus being

grades in high school. A video is a supplement to the application, and is an opportunity to show us another side of themselves beyond what they tell us on paper."

Nicole Demmert, a former Monmouth University admissions counselor, said, "I am happy Monmouth decided to embrace the idea of a video submission option through Facebook. While traveling and talking to students in different high schools along the East Coast, I found that many of them were interested in utilizing this new method."

Although only four students have chosen to provide admissions with a video submission via Facebook officials at Monmouth are sure that prospective students in the near future will become more comfortable with the idea, and opting for a video submission will become more popular.

were said to not be found appealing to the public, including Methane, Acetic Acid and Butane. The other seven cases included gift cards to several local establishments. Contestants had the opportunity to eliminate some cases, while choosing others for bigger prizes. There was a total of 250 dollars of prizes awarded to students during this event.

Committee members from Colleges Against Cancer were also set up at tables in the Student Center to inform students and employees about the dangerous and harmful effects of tobacco and smoking cigarettes. For current smokers, members suggested for them to throw out their pack of cigarettes and take a "Quit Kit." "The Quit Kit had hard candy and gum in it and also many different brochures about the dangers of smoking. We also passed out bubbles so smokers would be blowing bubbles rather than smoke and free bags of popcorn for something to munch on," Smith said.

The Great American Smoke-out, which takes place throughout the nation, was coordinated by Colleges Against Cancer on Thursday. President Mallory Rapisarda said, that the event is a day designed for smokers

to begin quitting. "For this, the committee taped out with caution tape 25 feet from the door because according to the New Jersey Smoke Free Air Act a person needs to smoke at least 25 feet from the entrance of any building."

Passalacqua said that the turnout for this event was good. "We had about 20 people compete in the game which was done in a deal or no deal type of game. For the prizes we had gift cards donated from various different stores throughout the community and Monmouth University book store donated some apparel and university merchandise that we gave away to the night winners."

After being a part of Relay for Life last year, Alexa Passalacqua said she was motivated to be a part of the E-board for Colleges Against Cancer. "I found it so fun and the committee is amazing and when we plan things and hold events we always have fun together. So when they were forming an e-board and getting Colleges Against Cancer together I jumped at the opportunity to get involved."

Out of all of the events, Smith said that her most favorite is ultimately Relay for Life. "It is just wonderful to see our students coming together with employees and community members for 12 hours throughout the night until

dawn and watch as they experience the emotions of a Relay For Life. It is a time to honor survivors and also remember all who lost their battle to cancer. Needless to say it is very emotional but also there is a lot of joy. We have live bands; face painting for the children; performances by volunteer choirs and a local dance school; Mz. Relay contest and events every hour throughout the night so you will hear cheers and laughter also," Smith said.

"These events marketed the Relay for Life event on April 23rd and our efforts on both of these events and the entire week helped us to reach 35 teams which is a great success so early in the year," Rapisarda said. Rapisarda also mentioned that she attended the Eastern Division Relay for Life Summit, where the University won the following three awards: "Pack the Track" which means the University had the most survivors out of the New York and New Jersey College Relays, along with "Highest Online Revenue" and "Top Net Percent Increase over 2008".

Smith also said that as a result of the information provided this week, she hopes that many University students and employees will quit smoking.

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The Truth of Pearl Harbor

“A date that will live in infamy...” were the words of President Franklin D. Roosevelt on December 8, 1941 when the United States and Britain declared war on Japan in response of the attack on Pearl Harbor the U.S Naval Base located on the southern coast of Oahu Island, Hawaii.

Right after Thanksgiving and before Christmas the attack on Pearl Harbor by the Japanese, was a day no one would ever forget. Even now people gather to remember the men and women who died that day. They gather to remember the event that determined that the U.S. would become involved in World War II.

World War II lasted from 1939 to 1945, a European War between the Axis Countries: Germany, Japan, Italy (including Romania, Hungary, Bulgaria, and Croatia) and the Allied Countries: U.S., England, Soviet Union (including France, Canada, and China). Causes of World War II range from opinions and situations from nationalistic tensions to pure hatred of the results from World War I. The Great Depression in the 1930's didn't improve the situations either.

The U.S. was not involved from the beginning but after the attack on the Navy Base, the U.S. remained involved until the end of the war, drafting men from all over the country to fight.

Over the years there has been

confusion about what really happened on December 7, why it happened, often leading to conspiracy theories and wild assumptions. “The Truth Seeker” website provided excellent information, only the facts, behind Pearl Harbor written by James Perloff. In his article he explained and provided evidence that President Franklin D. Roosevelt had prior knowledge of the impending Pearl Harbor attack and refused to warn and prepare anyone beforehand. The President pointed the blame on Navy Admiral Husband E. Kimmel and General Walter C. Short an Army Lieutenant for their negligence of being prepared and therefore gained acceptance from the U.S. to go into the European War.

According to a “pre-war Gallup poll showed 88 percent of Americans opposed U.S. involvement in the European war.” Roosevelt stated during the 1940 election-year speech, “I have said this before, but I shall say it again and again and again: Your boys are not going to be sent into any foreign wars.” This was a statement due to post World War I feelings from the U.S. that the war did not improve things and though we won, we still lost men.

“Tyler Kent, a code clerk at the U.S. embassy in London, discovered secret dispatches between Roosevelt and Winston Churchill, who was England's prime minister from 1940-1945. These revealed that FDR—despite contrary

campaign promises—was determined to engage America in the war.” Some of the countries that remained neutral during the war were: Sweden, Switzerland, Spain and Portugal. Therefore when the days before the Pearl Harbor attack the navy was warned of an attack but one in Asia by Japan therefore no threat to them.

In 2001 Pearl Harbor starring Ben Affleck (Good Will Hunting, Dogma), Josh Hartnett (Black Hawk Down, The Faculty), and Kate Beckinsale (Underworld, Whiteout) produced by Jerry Bruckheimer (producer of the Pirates of the Caribbean movies) and Michael Bay (known mostly for the Transformers movies) was released into theaters.

The movie sent the audience back in time leading up to the attack on the Hawaii base. The audience enjoyed a film filled with special effects and explosions but also historical inaccuracies that most people either ignored or didn't notice. After doing a lot of research online the following inaccuracies were found. Just some of the plethora in the film.

These came from Spiritus-Temporis.com, copyrighted in 2005:

Admiral Kimmel was not on a golf course on the morning of the attack, nor was he notified of the Japanese embassy leaving Washington D.C prior to the attack.

Navy Nurse Betty claimed to have been 17, lying about her age to be accepted however Navy Nurses

had to be Registered Nurses to join the Navy Nurse Corps. This means they have to have three years of training and passed a State Board examination. The minimum age to join the Navy Nurses Corp was 22.

Affleck and Hartnett's characters take part in the Doolittle bombing raid over Tokyo, but as fighter pilots this is something they have not been allowed to participate in.

Japanese aircraft of that period were painted grey, not green.

In the film Navy Nurse Betty dies during the Pearl Harbor attack. In actuality no Navy Nurses died as a result of the enemy action during the entirety of World War II, including the Pearl Harbor attack.

Let's be honest about this one:

The attack began at 6:37 am, making it unlikely that children would be hiking or playing baseball.

So are the inaccuracies done to make the movie more interesting, or are they truly bits of information ignored from being checked? It's clear that most if not all movies about historical battles and events are inaccurate in some way, shape, or form.

According to the website “Pearl Harbor Remembered” the first wave of 183 Japanese aircrafts left under Admiral Nagumo's orders left at 6:10 am. The second wave of 168 aircrafts took flight at 7:15 am. In between that time chaos was unleashed upon the base.

“Commander Logan Ramsey of Ford Island Command Center sends out a message for all radio-

men on duty to send out in plain English “Air Raid Pearl Harbor This Is No Drill.” Though some were able to get onto ships and fire back at the aircrafts we were not able to get our own aircrafts into the air to fight them until long after the attack was over. By 8:08 am, KGMB radio interrupts the music to announce, “All Army, Navy, and Marine personnel to report to duty...” This announcement continued two more times on the radio and by 11:00A.M. all schools on the island were ordered to close. After 1:30 pm, the Japanese withdraw from attacking, with the third wave of aircrafts refraining from taking off. After the U.S. announced its declaration of war against Japan, Germany and Italy declare war on the U.S. on December 11, 1941. The rest as they say is history.

So the big question remains, was Pearl Harbor an attack that could have been prevented or something we never saw coming? We may never truly know. What we do know for certain is that “five of eight battleships at Pearl Harbor were sunk or sinking, with the rest damaged. Several other ships and most Hawaii-based combat planes were also knocked out and over 2,400 Americans were dead.”

December 7 will remain a day in remembrance of the attack on Pearl Harbor and the event that began the U.S. involvement in World War II. So remember to pay your respects, salute the American flag, and always be proud to be an American.

I like reading this because it is very true but not many people seem to understand it or follow the concept. This type of thinking relates to the way of the Buddha on his journey by way of the eight fold path. In life man suffers because of objects, or material things. It is hard to escape misery when chasing objects because once you succeed you will be forced to want something else. If you simplify your life and your want for material objects you will be able to focus more on enjoying life, thus, bringing forth happiness.

Kyrie was putting on pounds as the days went by and was doing well, but Brielle had difficulties. She cried a lot and seemed blue-faced at times. One nurse finally decided it'd be a good idea to place Brielle in her sister's incubator with her. Nothing else had worked so she gave it a try. Studies have shown that just a simple hug can improve your health. According to an article in USA Today, a study from the American Psychosomatic Society showed that a hug from your partner everyday can reduce your levels of stress.

"Loving contact before a tough day at work could carry over and protect you throughout the day," says psychologist Karen Grewen with the School of Medicine at the University of North Carolina-Chapel Hill.

Tiffany Field of the Touch Research Institute at the University of Miami Medical School did research showing that touch lowers output of cortisol, a stress hormone. When cortisol lowers, there's a surge of two "feel good" brain chemicals, serotonin and dopamine.

Let me explain. When approaching someone, the hug will depend on what kind of relationship you have with that person. If it's a family member, you must approach kindly, but not too emotionally. Always smile when letting go. Where the hands go doesn't matter for family won't really care. (Never grab the butt, though, no matter how much Aunt Milly likes to grab yours.)

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Bob Dylan's *Christmas in the Heart*

"Do You Hear What I Hear," the classic Christmas song that was penned in 1962, the same year Bob Dylan's debut album was released, appears as the second track on Dylan's latest release, *Christmas in the Heart*. "Do you hear what I hear?" was the same question fans were asking themselves upon the CD's release last month, many who never expected "the voice of a generation" to trade in secular rock for sacred hymns and Christmas carols.

Dylan, who is introduced at his concerts as, "the poet laureate of rock 'n' roll, the voice of the promise of the '60s counterculture, the guy who forced folk into bed with rock, who donned makeup in the '70s and disappeared into a haze of substance abuse, who emerged to find Jesus, who was written off as a has-been by the end of the '80s, who suddenly shifted gears, releasing some of the strongest music of his career beginning in the late '90s," has seemingly shifted the gears of his career once again, only months after releasing *Together Through Life*, his follow-up to 2005's critically acclaimed *Modern Times*.

In his albums released during this decade, primarily on 2001's *"Love and Theft"* and the aforementioned *Modern Times* and *Together Through Life*, Dylan has taken on a crooner mentality, emulating classic singers in the genre of pre-rock balladry such as Gene Austin and Bing Crosby. Not only performing in the style of these

artists, both who found their greatest success during a time when current students' grandparents were still children, Dylan has also taken influence on their trademark songs. He used the melody from Crosby's "Where the Blue of the Night" (recorded in 1931), for example, for his own song, "When the Deal Goes Down" (recorded by Dylan in 2005). This, as many fans are aware, is only one example of many in which Dylan has recently "borrowed" others' melodies or lyrics for his own songs.

Given his apparent love for com-

backing vocalists. One would not expect Dylan's trademark gravelly voice and unique phrasing to work with Christmas carols, nor would one expect to hear an accordion or a fiddle, but combined with the backing vocals heavily featured in the mix and clever production, *Christmas in the Heart* tends to sound as if Bing Crosby, albeit with a raspy voice, had recorded a Christmas record at the Tex-Mex border.

The album, which is selling for about \$10 at most retailers, includes 15 songs such as "Here Comes Santa Claus," "Winter Wonderland," and "Have Yourself a Merry Little Christmas." Religious hymns are also featured, including "The First Noel" and "O' Little Town of Bethlehem," interesting for an artist who, although famously converted to Christianity decades ago, has since gone back to his Jewish roots.

Christmas in the Heart debuted at #1 on Billboard's holiday album charts upon its release in October. A music video for the album's single, "Must Be Santa," was released in November, described as, "...one bizarre Christmas treat" in the *Daily News*. The video opens with an accordion player and drummer performing at a holiday house party, entertaining a group of guests. The 68-year-old Dylan appears in wig and top hat, grasping a cigar, dancing with guests throughout the home. Little more explanation is needed – head over to YouTube and see the madness for yourself.

As fun as the album is to listen to, it is also serving a great cause.

All of Dylan's royalties from the album's sales will benefit charities during the holiday season,

each do what we can to help feed those who are suffering and support efforts to find long-term solu-

positions in Bing Crosby's style, it should then come as little surprise that Dylan followed in his footsteps, recording *Christmas in the Heart* to sound much like one of Crosby's classic Christmas tunes.

On the album, Dylan is accompanied by members of his touring and augmented by other musicians, including Los Lobos' David Hidalgo on accordion and a group of

Christmas in the Heart will not only help put the listener in the Christmas spirit, but also provides valuable funds for those in need during this time of year. It is an entertaining album with an excellent cause. Only time will tell whether the CD will prove to be as timeless as Bing Crosby's *White Christmas* or merely a folly, but for now, one can rest assured it will provide a terrific soundtrack for the holiday season quickly approaching. Whether you are a fan of Bob Dylan or not, you will find yourself singing along.

New Moon Will Only Make Fans Howl

When Hollywood adapts something, the result can fall into three different groups. They include those who like the original work and movie, those who haven't read the original work but are intrigued by the film, and those who have not read the work adapted and don't care about the film. As a guy, *The Twilight Saga: New Moon* (or *New Moon*) falls into the last category.

That isn't to say that this film didn't look promising. The trailer offered more action and drama than *Twilight* did. Yet, *New Moon* didn't meet any expectations and fell in the same rut as the first film. Having never read the *Twilight* series, it is unclear what was changed or kept the same. The bottom line seems to be that unless audiences are fans of *Twilight*, they won't enjoy the movie too much.

In the sequel to *Twilight* and based on the novel by Stephenie Meyer, *New Moon* follows Bella Swan (Kristen Stewart) living in Forks, WA as she engages in a supernatural relationship with a 109-year-old vampire, Edward Cullen (Robert Pattinson). Bella has turned 18-years-old and started her senior year of high school, but her thoughts and feelings remain with Edward. She desires for him to turn her into a vampire so they can be together forever, but Edward is content in his ways and refuses to grant Bella's wish.

While at the Cullen's house for Bella's birthday, danger arises when she cuts herself opening a present. This causes Jasper

by becoming an "adrenaline junkie," doing things like jumping off seaside cliffs.

Soon, Bella finds comfort with her friend Jacob Black (Taylor Lautner). As they begin to spend more time together, their relationship builds to the next level. She starts to fill in the void caused by Edward's departure with Jacob. However, things start to go wrong in Bella's life again when she discovers her best friend is a werewolf.

As she starts to come to terms with this part of Jacob's life and connects more, her heart still yearns for Edward and one misinterpreted incident pushes Bella to find Edward and keep their love alive.

Under the direction of Chris Weitz (*The Golden Compass*), the movie achieves a different look. The environments have fall colors composing the scenes, helping to make the movie not as cold and dark as the first film. In addition,

nicely handled it doesn't make up for waiting for the next fight to happen. Of course, this isn't an action movie, but the film doesn't move as fast as non-*Twilight* fans will want it to. It takes time for the story to unravel, but for some it may take too much time. The movie is so bogged down in emotion it doesn't present much passion for casual movie viewers. While the script by Melissa Rosenberg has a somewhat better story than the first, it still doesn't work a lot of the time and offers some weird moments. Too many times, Bella has a voiceover during a scene, which becomes less meaningful by being so plenty and start to drag down the movie.

Now, some scenes are meant to be funny yet other times the humor comes from how ridiculous a scene plays out on the screen. For example, when Bella is riding motocross bikes with Jacob and cuts her head, he does the

Cullen bloodthirsty and tries to attack Bella but is thwarted by Edward. Realizing the danger that Bella is in and against turning her into a vampire, Edward and his family leave Forks. This causes Bella's world to collapse and tries to fill this empty void

tion to this, Weitz directs some pretty good action scenes which assist in picking up the pace of the film during the long, emotional scenes including some great, although extremely large, werewolves battling.

However, while the action is

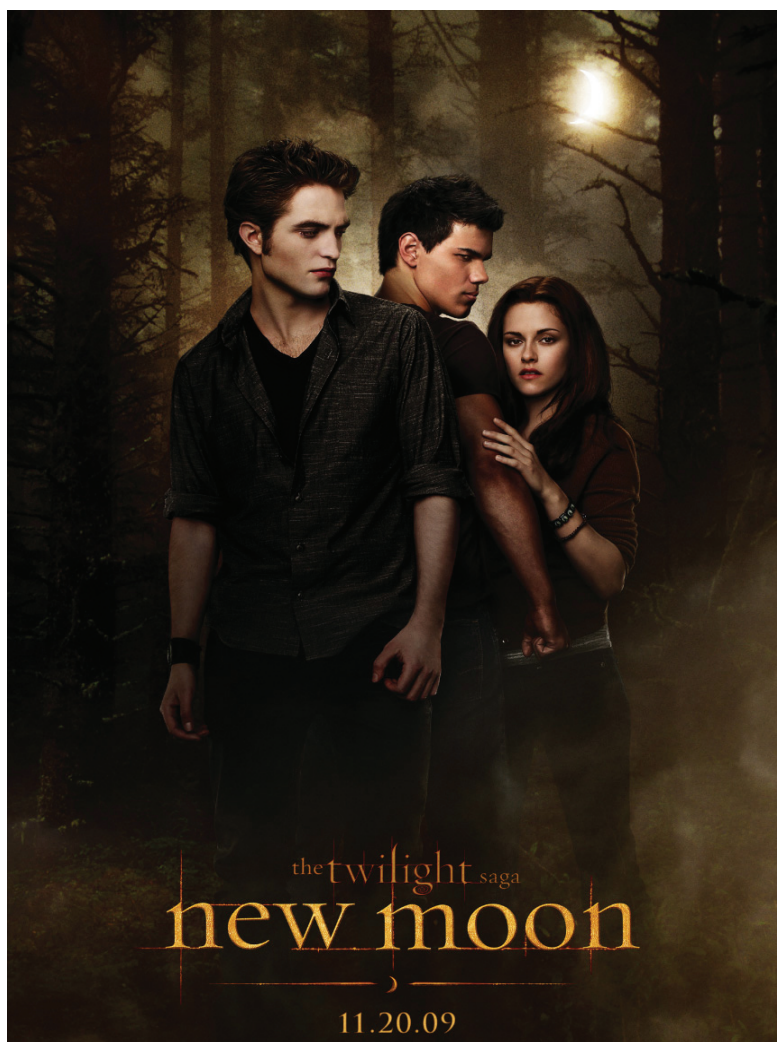

only thing a guy can do. He takes off his shirt and dabs her head with it, which no doubts helps to show off his body for the female fans. (There were equal gasps and laughter at the viewing I went to. Hearing these reactions was a benefit to seeing *New Moon* with a large audience).

Secondly, having Edward appear to Bella when she is doing reckless and adrenaline-filled activities was just weird and annoying. The better move would have been to have only Edward's voice be heard in Bella's head. Instead, this

makes Edward seem like a character from the TV show *Quantum Leap*, trying to help her find her way back home.

Now in *New Moon*, the cast has improved a bit from their performances in *Twilight*. Stewart actually shows a few more emotions that help to develop her character in the beginning. She smiles and seems to be in love rather than unemotional. However, once Edward leaves, Stewart falls into the same moody appearance that she gave previously. Overall, her performance here doesn't feel that much different from the first movie.

Pattinson develops his character by being less creepy. Still, he makes Edward such a moody guy that it seems to be his only trait except for showing his love for Bella.

Another thing Pattison does one time is not look Stewart in the face right away when he's talking to her. While, the film might have called for this, it just doesn't work because a connection between these two soul mates is lost. For Pattinson to have made a more personal con-

nection, he should have stared deep into her eyes instantly.

Lastly, Lautner as Jacob gets his moment in the spotlight after being a side character in *Twilight*. He gives a fair performance as this tough and aggressive rookie werewolf and works well in his scenes with Stewart. While the trailers make Lautner out to be more interesting than Pattinson, they are pretty much the same.

Now, this isn't to say the film lacks standouts in the casts. Michael Sheen, from the *Underworld* franchise plays Aro, the head of the Volturi or the vampire aristocracy. He gives class to his character and makes him interesting to watch even though toward the end of his performance he's a bit too animated with wide eyes and large gasps. Furthermore, the show stealer of *New Moon* is the talented Dakota Fanning as Jane, a member of the Volturi, who does a wonderful job acting as a creepy but intriguing vampire. She puts a lot of spirit in her character and shows she has a deadly supernatural power, which makes her a force to be reckoned with.

For any *Twilight* fans who read to the end of this review, this was about looking at *New Moon* from a cinematic point of view. From this perspective, the film moves slowly and isn't engaging to watch despite some improvements.

As fans count down the days until *The Twilight Saga: Eclipse* premieres on June 30, 2010, this critic will leave the diehard *Twilight* fans alone to enjoy their passion as this feeling doesn't seem mutual.

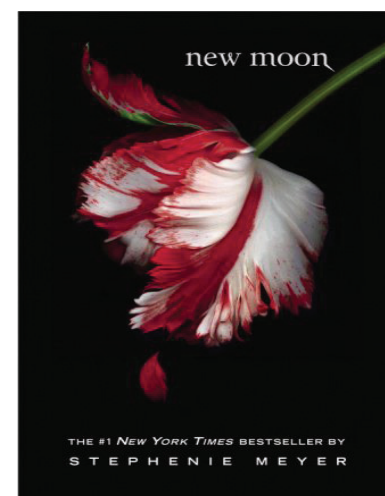

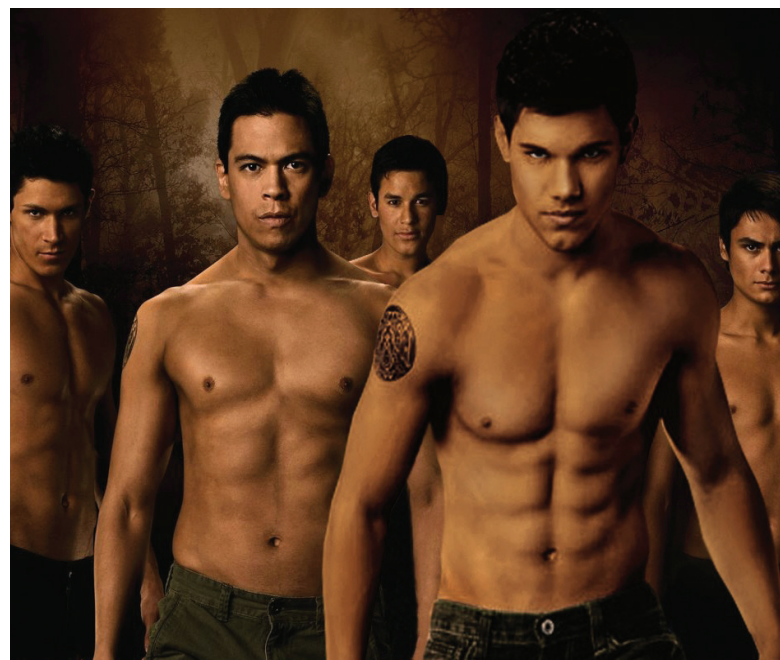
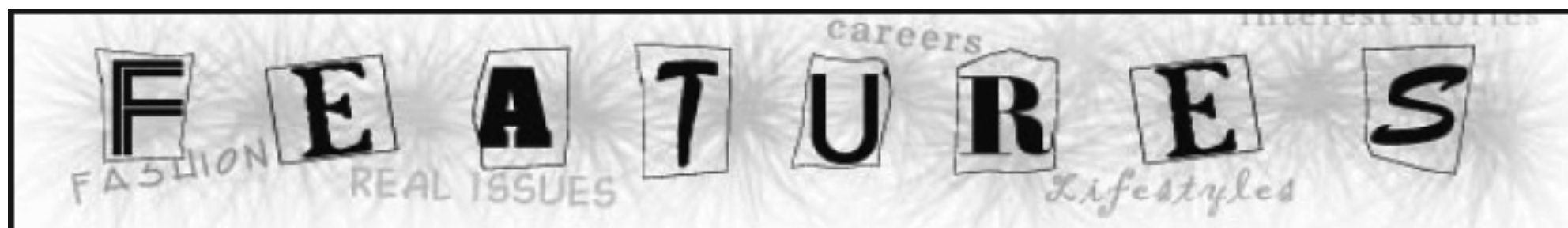

The United Nations Climate Change Conference is set for December 7 thru December 18. Since his childhood, Brooklyn-raised Ray Rossi wanted to be a radio personality. After years of hard work, his dream came true. Today, as the less-eccentric half of NJ101.5FM's controversial Jersey Guys, Rossi is one of the most recognized voices in New Jersey. He and his Yoo-Hoo guzzling co-host, Casey Bartholomew, spend five hours every weekday evening discussing politics, pop culture, and current events. “I don't like to label my [political ideology],” said Rossi. “While I am a registered Republican, I vote by the issue.” One thing Rossi was determined to vote against, however, was Governor Jon Corzine. For years, the Jersey Guys have opposed Corzine's monetary policies. They

While the Jersey Guys dedicate a large portion of their air-time to political issues, current events and pop culture often sneak into their discussions. A frequent topic of conversation on radio and television programs across the country has been the H1N1 scare. The



Hawks Fall to Robert Morris on Senior Day

Saturday marked the final game of the 2009 football season, which also meant the last time 12 seniors would take the field as a Hawk. Even with emotions running high, Monmouth failed to close out the year on a winning note as Robert Morris compiled a 23-9 victory to spoil the last collegiate game of their careers and setting their record at 5-6 overall and 5-3 in conference.

“These past five years have been such an incredible experience,” said senior running back David Sinisi, who finished with 62 yards on 20 carries. “I just wish the outcome could have been different.”

The game got off to a slow start with the first three possessions resulting in punts. It wasn’t until the 2:52 mark of the first stanza that Robert Morris took a 7-0 lead, which came after a 10 yard run by Miles Russ. This would be the lone score of the half as the defense from both squads proved to be too much for the offensive units.

A reenergized RMU squad took the field in the second half and increased their lead to 10-0 after kicker Garret Clawson nailed a 26 yard field goal.

It didn’t take long for the Colonials to strike again when on their next offensive set quarterback Jeff Sinclair, who finished the game on 13-of-17 passing with 128 yards, connected with Sherrod Evans on a four-yard touchdown pass. The PAT was blocked by MU’s Jose Gumbs, who returned it to the

house, putting Monmouth on the board and cutting the lead to 16-2.

The visitors put together yet another scoring drive to open the fourth quarter when Sinclair threw another touchdown pass, this time a 31 yarder to Anthony Coleman to give them a 23-2 advantage with 11:52 left in regulation.

The Blue and White responded with their only score of the contest when Kyle Frazier, who finished with a 130 yards on 13-of-34 passing, hit a streaking Ron Lauch for a 15-yard pass into the end zone to cut the lead to 23-9. Unfortunately, times was not on the Hawks side and with just under five minutes to play Monmouth’s attempted comeback was cut short.

Lauch led the receivers with five catches for 57 yards and a score, while Rodney Salomon and Ryan Folsom each hauled in three for 31 yards and 22 yards respectively.

Defensively, Dave Ogden finished with a team best eight stops, including three for loss, and a sack. Kendall Haley, Jeff Brady, and safety Kenny Amsel also chipped in with eight tackles each while Amsel also pulled down an interception, his fifth of the year.

With the conclusion of the season, several Hawks garnered post-season accolades. A total of six Monmouth players were selected to All-Conference teams, while sophomore linebacker/safety Jose Gumbs was named the Northeast Conference Defensive Player of the Year.

The Hawks who joined Gumbs on the First Team All-NEC included safety Kendall Haley, running back David Sinisi, guard Shawn Wright and tackle Kevin

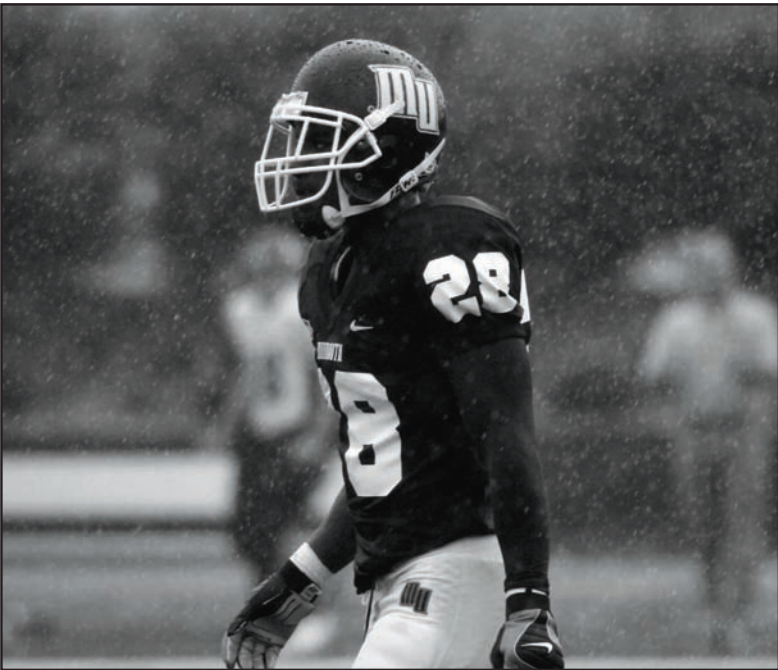

Sterling. Defensive tackle David Kennedy was name to the second team.

Gumbs, who led the Blue and White in tackles this season with 95 stops, became the second consecutive Hawk to win the honor of NEC Defensive Player of the Year, after senior Kevin Walsh took home the award last season. Gumbs recorded double-digit tackles in seven of the nine games he played in this season, finishing with a game average of 10.56 tackles per contest, ranking 13th in the nation. The redshirt sophomore started the season at safety, but injuries led to his move to outside linebacker for the last three games of the year.

Sinisi, who earned his fourth all-conference honors, finished the season with 1,437 yards on 300 carries and 13 rushing touchdowns. Sinisi, who was also a two-time Walter Payton Award finalist (the Heisman Trophy for D-1 AA), had 17 total TDs in 2009, finishing off the most decorated MU football career with 72 total touchdowns, the most in NEC history. He ran for over 100 yards in eight of 11 games in his final season in a Hawk uniform, completing his career with 25 games of over 100 yards rushing.

The fifth-year senior is the current active NCAA career leader in rushing yards, carries per game and scoring. Sinisi’s 5,049 career

rushing yards rank 15th in FCS history and first in NEC history.

Leading the way for Sinisi on the right side were offensive linemen Wright and Sterling. Wright, a redshirt junior, makes his third appearance on the All-NEC list. The right guard was a 2007 second team selection before earning back-to-back First Team All-NEC nods.

Wright started in 10 of 11 games, missing the final game of the season with an injury. Sterling, who finished his career starting 32 straight games at right tackle, is a member of the First Team All-NEC for the second consecutive season.









Starting his first season at safety, Haley joined Gumbs as the only two MU defenders on the First Team All-NEC. Haley finished second on the team in tackles with 86 takedowns, which ties him for the 11th most in school history.

The junior posted 11 tackles in two games this season, while recording three interceptions and a forced fumble. One of those interceptions Haley returned for 65 yards and a touchdown to give Monmouth a September win over Duquesne.

Kennedy earns all-conference honors for the first time in his career after recording 33 tackles and 3.5 sacks as a senior. The defensive tackle had six tackles-for-a-loss and a blocked kick in 2009. Kennedy’s 13.5 sacks is ninth most in Monmouth history.

Next year’s squad will have a difficult time replacing the 12 senior contributors that will be departing, but return the starting quarterback and the reigning NEC Defensive Player of the Year.

After winning the NEC championship the Hawks were lined up to play the Connecticut Huskies on the Great Lawn on Thursday, November 19, at 12:00 pm in the first round of the NCAA Tournament. The latest rankings had the Hawks as the no. five team in the country while the Huskies were ranked at the 12 spot.

From the beginning the stage was set for an epic match; neither

there was no tomorrow, the result was two halves of play and two overtimes with zero goals, and a shootout left to decide the winner.

Through five kicks in the shootout the score was 3-3 and with a save from Meredith the Hawks were looking to close the game. Sophomore Cesar Blacido stepped up to a pressure filled situation and blasted the ball by Huskies goalie Josh Ford to send the Hawks to victory and onto the next round of the NCAA tournament to face the no. 9 seed Harvard University.

Through the first half of play the Hawks outshot the Crimson 2-1 but found themselves at a 1-0 deficit. In the second half 30 minutes of play went by before the next goal and unfortunately for the Hawks it wasn’t scored by them. The incredible run the Hawks were on was slowly closing and was finally put away when a Harvard player scored the third goal of the game at the 84 minute mark. The Hawks season came to a close against Harvard by a 3-0 score; it’s worth noting that senior defender and

Women’s Basketball in Win Column

The Monmouth University women’s basketball team defeated Davidson, 46-43 in the consolation game of the 2009 Hampton Inn Invitational on Saturday afternoon at Trask Coliseum on the campus of UNC Wilmington.

Trailing Davidson by a point, 43-42, with 23 seconds left, Monmouth freshman Gabby Singer swished a three-pointer from the left wing to give the Hawks a two-point advantage they wouldn’t relinquish. After an offensive foul by the Wildcats, Singer then hit one of two free throws and Davidson’s Alex Thompson missed a desperation three attempt at the buzzer.

“This was a huge step forward for our young basketball team,” said Monmouth head coach Stephanie V. Gaitley. “To come back the way we did and beat a good basketball team is big for us. When you play defense the way we did in the second half, you’re going to have a chance to win games. This was a statement to our kids that playing defense puts us in a position to steal games when we don’t shoot well.”

MU’s defense limited Davidson to 15 second half points, it’s best defensive half of the season, on 28.6% (4-for-14) field goal shooting.

The Hawks, who improve to 2-3 on the season with the win, were paced by Singer and sophomore Alexis Canady, who each scored 11 points. Singer scored nine of her 11 in the second half, includ-

ing the deciding three-pointer. She added five rebounds, two assists and four steals, and hit 5-of-6 free throws in the game. Canady added six boards as well, while freshman Alysha Womack contributed 10 points, four rebounds and three steals.

After Julia Paquette scored the first basket of the game for Davidson, five points apiece from Womack and Canady pushed Monmouth’s early advantage to 11-4 with 12:41 left in the first half. Davidson then went on a 13-0 scoring run, keyed by eight straight points from 6-3 center Sarah Davis, to take a 20-15 lead with 6:03 left before halftime.

The Wildcats took a 28-24 lead into halftime after Paquette scored to end the half. MU shot 32% from the floor in the first half, compared to 54.5% for Davidson.

The Hawks connected on 3-of-6 of their first half three-pointers with Canady hitting both of her attempts and Womack, who led the Hawks with nine first half points, making her only triple. Canady added eight opening half points while freshman Abby Martin contributed six rebounds.

The Hawks, who were outscored 24-8 in the paint in the first half, committed 17 turnovers in the opening 20 minutes, which Davidson turned into 19 points. MU, which hit 5-of-7 first half free throws, outrebounded Davidson 21-11 in the opening period, including 10-3 on the offensive glass.

Monmouth was able to tie the contest at 30-30 after two free

throws from Adriana Allen with 10:14 left in the second half, but DC retook the lead after a three-pointer from Ashley Lax with 8:45 remaining. Davidson kept MU at arm’s length, maintaining between a three and five point advantage, until Canady connected on a three with 3:20 left to cut the lead to 41-40.

Martin added three points and seven rebounds for MU while Thibault added three points and three assists. The Hawks shot 28.9% (13-for-45) for the game, while Davidson connected on 44.4% (16-of-36) of its field goals in the game. Monmouth hit six three’s in the game, three from Canady and two from Singer, and outrebounded the Wildcats 39-28, including 16-5 on the offensive end.

Davidson was led by Sarah Davis, who scored 14 points and pulled down six boards. DC outscored Monmouth in the paint 28-12 and 20-18 in points off turnovers. The two teams each committed 30 turnovers.

In addition to defeating Davidson, MU’s Womack was named to the 2009 UNCW-Hampton Inn Invitational All-Tournament Team. She joins Sarah Davis from Davidson, Martha White and Brittany Blackwell from UNC Wilmington and Samantha Pollino from Duquesne.

Alex Gensler from Duquesne was named the tournament’s Most Valuable Player.

The Hawks return to action on Wednesday when they hosts Stony Brook at 7:00 pm in the MAC.

Men’s Basketball Earns Second Victory of the Year

Coleman offered his second straight 20 point game, and Justin Sofman nailed five
